### **Positive Behaviours**

## In Saint John's we love to celebrate and promote positive behaviour. This may involve you:

- Receiving praise and encouragement on your own, as part of a group or as part of your class.
- Visiting another teacher or the principal to share positive work, effort or behaviour.
- · Being acknowledged at assembly.
- Being celebrated on the school's website, displays or newsletter.
- Receiving a written comment in one of your books or getting a sticker.
- Being awarded a certificate, prize, house point, class treat, homework pass etc.
- Enjoying golden time.
- Going on a class trip or treat.
- Being awarded a job of responsibility.
- Your parents being informed about positive behaviour, effort or work.

### To support positive behaviour we will:

- Teach and model positive behaviour.
- · Promote and display our school rules and class rules.
- · Keep to our regular routines.
- Support you to make good choices and support you when things go wrong.
- Resolve and respond to problems/inappropriate behaviours quickly and help issues/relationships get restored.
- · Monitor how things are going.

We will always highlight the behaviour you are using not you!

## When things go Wrong!

There may be times when sanctions have to be imposed.

Sanctions should not be seen as punishments, but instead as a focus to help you change behaviour/s.

In St. John's we always strive for a restorative approach and take account the importance of maintaining good relationships.

We always aim to **RESPOND**, **RESOLVE** and **RESTORE**.

### In St. John's we believe that sanctions should be:

- Applied so that you are aware that your behaviour is unacceptable.
- Applied in a fair and consistent manner by all staff.

### Sanctions may include...


- A verbal warning— we will always try to remind you of the rule.
- Losing some or all of your golden time.
- Time out in the playground at break or lunch time.
- Referral to the principal.
- Break/lunch time sit in/s
- A phone call home to parents.
- Withdrawal of privileges may be used when appropriate.

To show pride in our school we expect you to:


- Wear school uniform.

## Rights

### Pupils in Saint John's have the right to:

- Be valued members of the school community.
- Get help when they seek it, whether with their work or with bullying or personal worries, and have a sympathetic ear for their ideas and concerns.
- Be treated fairly, consistently and with respect.
- Learn and be educated in a calm, safe, well-managed and stimulating environment.
- Work and play within clearly defined and fairly administered codes of conduct.
- Experience a broad, balanced and suitably differentiated curriculum, and to have any special learning needs identified and met.
- Be consulted about matters that affect them and have their views listened to and, as far as reasonable, acted upon.
- Make mistakes and to learn from them.
- Develop and extend their interests, talents and abilities.



## Responsibilities

### Pupils in Saint John's have the responsibility to:

- Come to school on time, suitably equipped for their day and with any homework done to the best of their ability.
- Cooperate in class with the teacher and with their peers.
- Work to the best of their ability in class.
- Conform to the conventions of good behaviour and abide by the school and class rules.
- Seek help if they do not understand or are in difficulties.
- Show respect for all members of the school community.
- Respect the right of other pupils to learn.
- Care for their own property, the property of other pupils and all school property.
- Avoid behaving in any way which would endanger others in and out of class.
- Move guietly around the school.
- Behave appropriately on the way to and from school.
- Act as appropriate ambassadors for the school on for example, school trips, sports events etc.
- Accept ownership for their behaviour and learning, and to develop the skill of working independently.
